Content

The EPF climate change and ecological crisis committee, in association with and the IPA climate committee, the EPF Psychoanalysis, Migration and Cultural Identities committee and the EPF Migration and refugees subcommittee would like to provide a discussion group as part of the pre-congress timetable in Oslo.

We will show clips of the Danish TV series '*Families like ours*' and invite discussion. This drama /dystopian- science fiction series anticipates a situation where unprecedented floods are threatening Denmark, to the point where the government orders the evacuation of its population. The intertwined problems of climate change and associated migration are therefore brought to the forefront.

We conceive of the climate catastrophe as a multi-dimensional issue deeply interconnected with inequality and migration. We would like to offer a space for participants to think about the impact of the climate catastrophe and its consequences on their patients, their work and themselves. Our aim is to provide a containing space within which feelings and thoughts about these can be reflected upon.
