## Content

In psychoanalysis, neutrality has traditionally been linked to analytic abstinence: the suspension of moral judgment, advice, personal investment, memory and desire. Yet in today's digitally saturated environment - shaped by AI expansion and post-human relationality - neutrality renewed theoretical and clinical articulations.

This panel explores how neutrality evolves when the subject becomes hybridized through the techno - environment. Particular attention will be given to countertransference biases such hybridizations may elicit, as well as to the shifting dynamics of transference once the boundary between human and non-human begins to dissolve.

Rather than relaying on traditional frameworks, we propose a mode of neutrality that supports processes of subjectivation unfolding with and through the non- human.

Clinical vignettes will illustrate how this hybrid form of neutrality reaffirms the vitality of psychoanalysis today: sustaining its relevance in contexts where symbolic structures destabilize and enabling new relational configurations.
